

A Level Easter Revision in London

Why do A level Revision Courses?

Summer examinations are of pivotal importance for lower-sixth as well as upper-sixth students. For lower-sixth students, regardless of whether the examinations are internal or external, their results will have considerable influence on their UCAS references and predicted grades. For upper-sixth students, their results will determine their university and career prospects.

Approach

Our tutors are all highly qualified graduates with considerable teaching experience. Many are examiners and are therefore attuned to the requirements and approaches demanded by the various examining boards.

The depth of content of A level specifications is such that it would be impractical to attempt an exhaustive coverage of any one specification in just five days. The aims of our courses are to cultivate a high level of understanding of core topic areas, to show students how to revise effectively and to foster good examination technique.

It is important to note the emphasis is on exam practice and revision, and not a replacement for teaching.

Specification content and the style of examination questions differ quite markedly from one board to another. Consequently, it is inappropriate in most cases for students who are being prepared for different boards to be taught together in the same group. We therefore ensure that our A level courses are both board- and specification-specific, with the exception of History and Literature courses, which are topic- or text-specific. In addition, we send out a pre-course questionnaire in which students are asked to identify their particular areas of concern.

Small classes are essential in order to provide the close attention which each student requires. All groups are limited to an absolute maximum of nine students, although the average is usually six or seven.

Course Structure

The precise content and the number of hours of tuition provided for each subject are given in the course outlines booklet.

40-hour courses for A level subjects operate from 9.00 am to 6.00 pm Monday to Friday with an hour for lunch. There are eight hours of tuition each day including invigilated exam practice and breaks.

20-hour courses for Year 12 students operate either mornings or afternoons Monday to Friday with four hours of tuition each day including invigilated exam practice and breaks.

Shorter, one-day and half-day courses are available in certain humanities subjects and modern foreign languages.

Feedback

At the end of the 20- and 40-hour courses, students are given a report in each subject, outlining areas of strength and weakness and providing specific suggestions for improvement.

Registration

In order to book a place, the person responsible for fees should complete and return the registration form along with the fees for the course.
