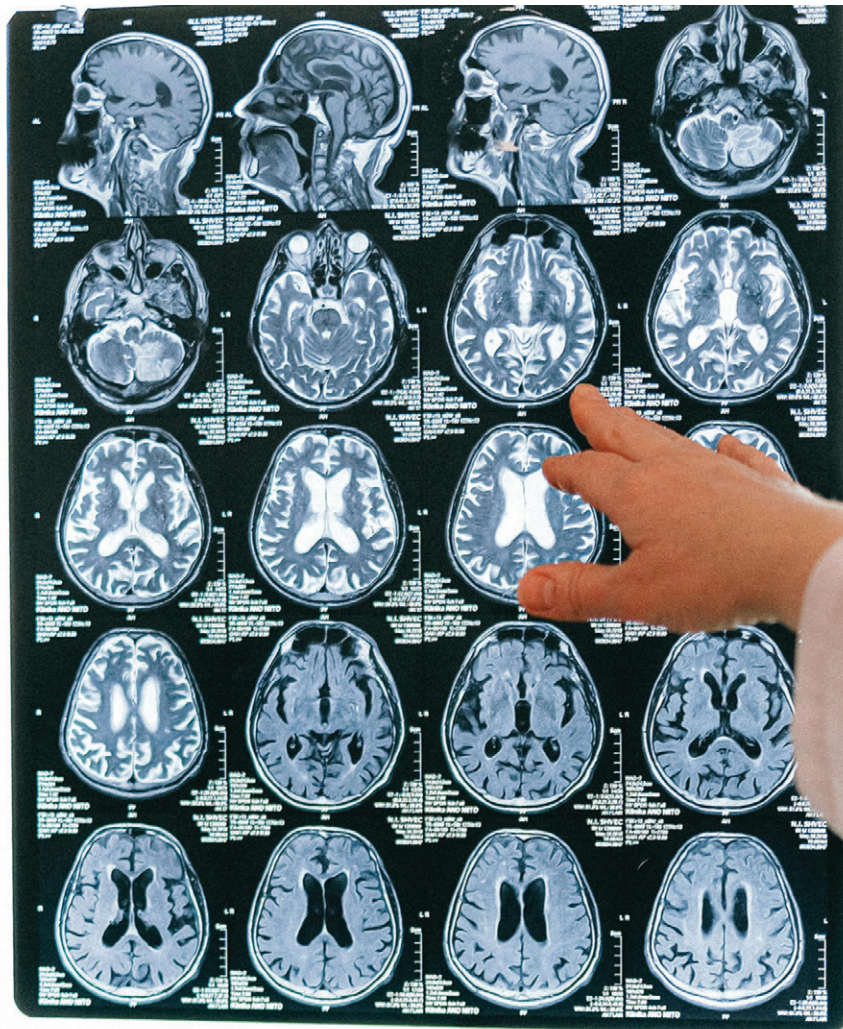
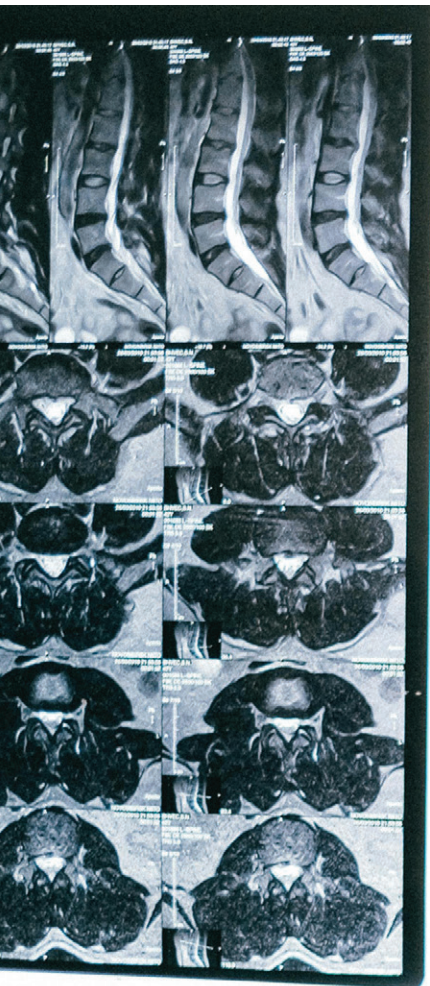

Applying to Medical School

First of all, let's be honest. No matter how much preparation a student is given, he or she has to be an excellent candidate to be offered a place to study Medicine. Only around 40% of applicants for Medicine are successful in gaining places and the common entry requirement for most UK universities is a minimum of AAA at A level. Becoming a successful doctor requires many skills as well as strength in academia, and it is the job of the admissions staff to decide who is the most suitable at interview.

How can MPW help?

We like to feel that we can add the 'gloss' that can make the difference between success and failure. A Medical School application comprises several elements and Admissions Tutors view each student's entry in the round. Predicted or actual grades at A level or equivalent, performance in specialist tests set by the universities, school references, the personal statement and performance at interview are all reviewed carefully before a candidate is offered a place or rejected.

MPW London's Medical School Preparation Programme covers four main areas:

- a personal statement review service
- interview practice with a real doctor

Studying Medicine in the UK as an International Student

Medicine is a highly competitive degree programme requiring both excellent grades and advanced English language skills. Each UK medical school admits a small number of international (non-EU) students each year amounting to around 7.5% of the total annual student intake.

Personal Statement

Your personal statement needs to convince admissions tutors that you are worthy of an interview, which is essential because most medical schools only issue conditional offers after their admissions panel have met you. Only 15-25% of Medical School applicants will be invited to interview: make sure you are one of them!

The personal statement is composed of three sections. In the first, you will explain why you want to study medicine. In the second, you will write about what you have done to prepare - your studies and any work experience, for example. In the third, you will tell the interviewer about your extra-curricular activities. To get started, think about how you'd answer the following questions:

- What interests you about medicine and why?
- Why do you want to be a doctor?
- What have you done to investigate the profession and how has that led you to this vocation?
- What did you learn from your work experience?
- What do you do apart from studying and why is this important to you?

Over the years, we have often been asked to give an opinion on the quality of a student's personal statement. Our tutors read around 350 personal statements every year, so they have a wealth of experience to call on in assessing what makes a good one. When you've finished your first draft, we can provide you with feedback on its strengths and weaknesses. We will offer guidance on what might make the statement more compelling and how it could be improved.

Aptitude tests

Most universities require applicants to sit aptitude tests as part of the application process. These include the UCAT and BMAT tests. Experience shows that students can benefit from familiarity with these tests: learning the techniques required to approach questions effectively; and awareness of the sort of questions to expect. Practising past papers and time management are crucial preparations for that all-important test day. We liaise with industry experts to provide focused tuition on the tests themselves including analysis of those spikier questions.

UCAT (the University Clinical Aptitude Test)

The UCAT has been adopted by 31 universities as part of their admissions procedure. It is designed to ensure that students have the mental capabilities, attitude and professional conduct required for a career in the medical field.

There are five sections to the UCAT which are based on the set of skills that Medical (and Dental) Schools believe are vital to be successful as a medical practitioner:

1. Verbal Reasoning
2. Decision Making
3. Quantitative Reasoning
4. Abstract Reasoning
5. Situational Judgement

The test lasts two hours and candidates can take it between 13 July and 24 September 2026.

Interviewers will be looking for evidence of general interest in and enthusiasm for your chosen subject and the motivation to work hard.

Why is preparation important for medical interviews?

The interview may be the crucial factor in distinguishing between candidates with similar results. It also enables candidates to make a case if their academic profile is strong but is equalled or bettered by other applicants. You need to prepare thoroughly – you will not get a second chance if you do not perform well and the more you practise, the better your chance of success.

Although you will be nervous, try to relax and enjoy talking to the interviewer – they are busy people and the fact that they have given up their time to meet you suggests that they want to offer you a place. Make it easy for them to do so!

What sort of questions could you face at interview

Questions often tend to be open ended, so there will be no 'correct' answer. There might be some incorrect ones though! Try the below:

- *Why should we choose you over the other candidate outside?*
- *Should smokers be treated on the NHS?*
- *What makes a good doctor?*
- *When you saw doctors using the MRI scanner on your work experience, what were they looking for?*
- *Tell me about a medical article you have read recently that has interested you.*
- *What do you know about treatment for cancer?*
- *What are the main problems facing the NHS at the moment?*
- *Should you withdraw life-prolonging treatment from a terminally ill patient?*
- *It says on your UCAS statement that you enjoyed*
- *Reading about X – what was it in particular that you learnt from that?*

At the interview, you need to prove that you can:

- listen effectively;
- absorb facts and ideas presented to you and assess their relevance;
- respond to problems and criticisms; and
- present arguments in a logical, clear manner.

Some of the most difficult questions often involve an ethical dilemma. With these types of questions, the interviewers are interested in whether or not you have understood the relevant issues, rather than in your opinion. Think about the background to the question, explore both sides of the argument, back-up your points with examples from your reading and finally draw a tentative conclusion.

How will MPW mock interviews help you in the real thing?

Practice makes perfect. As you familiarise yourself with the list of commonly asked questions, your responses will become smoother and more fluent. Our experienced tutors have spent years coaching students for these crucial interviews and know how to get the best from applicants, what an admissions tutor is looking for and the key points that any student might need to improve on. We also work with an external team of doctors to make sure that key medical issues or scientific questions can be asked, and we provide the sort of atmosphere that a student will encounter at interview.

How does the MPW interview process work?

Interviews are held by senior staff and external experts (usually practising doctors) at MPW in London and last for up to 40 minutes, after which verbal feedback is given as well as a written report.
