

About the College

MPW Cambridge, established in 1987, is a co-educational GCSE and A level college accepting up to 240 students each year. The college is situated in spacious and attractive premises a short walk from the centre of Cambridge.

No student is accepted at the college without attending an interview, the initial purpose of which is to provide parents and students with the best educational advice. If we feel that it is appropriate to offer a place at MPW, every effort is made during the interview to identify the right programme and options, often by means of detailed discussions with individual subject tutors.

Once a student is accepted at MPW, our aim is to provide the most effective possible preparation for the specific exams that he or she will be taking. Our method is based on intensive tuition in small groups, close personal monitoring of academic progress and regular

examination practice. We insist on strict punctuality in the attendance of lessons and the submission of homework, but are otherwise free of many of the school rules that today's students find restrictive.

Our reputation is based on having created a college in which students can enjoy working hard. The environment is friendly and informal, the tutors experienced and enthusiastic and the atmosphere positive and conducive to success. The systems that we have adopted have been developed over many years and are shared by all the colleges in the MPW group.

College Inspections

The college is registered as an independent school with the Department for Education and as such is subject to regular inspections by Ofsted (Office for Standards in Education). We have a highly qualified team of tutors, the majority of whom have several years of teaching experience at MPW. Many are examiners for the A level and GCSE subjects that they teach.

Tuition

Tuition takes place between the hours of 9.00 am and 6.00 pm on weekdays. Syllabus coverage is focused on the precise demands of the final examination and particular emphasis is placed on exam technique. It is a fundamental principle at MPW that all students in a given group are studying for the same examination on the same board on the same date. Under no circumstances do we mix students who are studying on courses of different durations. Of equal importance is our commitment to fewer than 10 students in any one class. With these group sizes it is possible to combine a lively and stimulating classroom atmosphere with the close individual attention that each student requires.

All Year 12 students attend additional study skills lessons in the Autumn term designed to improve note-taking, reading speed, memorisation, revision techniques and time management. MPW writes and produces its own study materials in all major subjects and students are encouraged to seek help from tutors between lessons when facing difficulties with a particular topic.

Facilities

Our buildings have bright, spacious teaching rooms, two study centres, an exam room, two student common rooms, canteen facilities, three science laboratories, three computer suites and an art room. All subjects have access to audio-visual facilities and whiteboards.

The work of the classroom is supported by a state of the art VLE and a full range of teaching resources. There is a comprehensive selection of textbooks, journals and past examination papers available to help students deepen and widen their subject knowledge and understanding. The college is an exam centre for all awarding bodies.

Supervision of Progress

MPW is well known for its friendly and supportive personal tutor system. Each student is assigned to a designated member of staff whose role is to supervise the academic progress, university applications and general welfare of a small group of students. Personal tutors keep in frequent contact with subject tutors and parents and are able to devote much of their time to helping and encouraging the students under their care. This is such an important three-point relationship, for all parties.

Regular, individual meetings are held to discuss progress in class, homework, test results, UCAS applications and reports. Written reports from the subject tutors are sent out four times over the course of each year. There are also parents' meetings that provide an opportunity for students' progress to be discussed face to face with tutors and personal tutors.

Examination Practice

We place considerable emphasis on regular testing under timed conditions, which we find plays a major part in building students' confidence and motivation. A level students sit regular timed assignments throughout the course of the Autumn, Spring and Summer terms. Most timed assignments test the understanding of work covered during the previous week. The remainder test the understanding of work covered during the previous half term or term, thus ensuring that revision is a continuous and cumulative process throughout the year. Students on GCSE courses sit end-of-unit tests twice per term in the Autumn and Spring terms and students in Years 10 and 12 also sit internal end-of-year exams.

Full mock examinations for the Summer examination session are usually held in March. All timed assignments, end-of-unit tests and mock examinations take place under supervised conditions that replicate the conditions under which public exams are sat.



University Guidance

The clear aim of the majority of our A level students is to secure a place on a competitive degree course after leaving MPW. It is a key part of the personal tutor's role to provide the help and guidance necessary to make the most appropriate choices of course and institution.

Degree Applications

For students in the lower sixth the process of applying to university begins in the Autumn and Spring terms with sessions to prepare them for choosing courses and writing personal statements. For those joining us in the upper-sixth year or retaking A levels, discussions about university entrance and application procedures begin in earnest during the initial student interview.

We have particular experience of the challenges faced by students who are applying for some of the more competitive courses such as Medicine, Veterinary Science and Law. We liaise with admissions tutors both before and after the publication of exam results and we have developed strong links with many of the departments attended by MPW students in the past. All students who are called for interview are encouraged to make use of our interview practice provision.

Our standalone Oxbridge and medical school programmes are designed to guide students' preparations for aptitude tests (UCAT, BMAT, TSA, TMUA, ELAT and LNAT), interviews and the short written assessments applicants are often required to complete at interview. For students applying to the University of Cambridge, where offers may be dependent on grades achieved in STEP examinations, we provide bespoke tuition to help them prepare for these.

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Activities Programme

For many of our students, sporting and other extracurricular activities play a vital role in promoting a balanced lifestyle. Students in the lower sixth participate in weekly activities relating to sport, ethics, science, debates, creative writing, enterprise and mindfulness. Such activities are designed to be constantly adapting to new student input. Their purpose is to stimulate new interests and prepare students for the role that extra-curricular activities play at university. Further activities also take place which are non-compulsory and open to all students. These include a range of sports, several charity fund-raising events, a Student Council, International Evenings and a Summer Graduation Ball.

MPW Guides

Our experience of university admissions has led to the publication of a series of MPW Guides on Higher Education. These guides cover general entrance procedures, admission to Oxford and Cambridge and admission to degree courses such as Medicine, Dentistry, Physiotherapy, Veterinary Science, Pharmacy and Pharmacology, Engineering, Business and Economics, Psychology, Law and Art School.

MPW Guides and our Oxbridge and Medicine mock interviews are used not only by our own students but also by pupils from a wide variety of other schools.

A level at MPW

We offer A levels in a wide range of subjects with no timetable restrictions on combinations of subjects or courses of different lengths.

Two-Year A level Courses

The majority of our students study traditional two-year A level courses. These courses are designed for students who are continuing at MPW after GCSE or for students from other schools who are seeking a change of environment after the fifth form.

In common with most schools in the independent sector, the majority of students joining us in the lower sixth study three subjects at A level and can opt to undertake an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ). This programme enables students to follow a broad and balanced academic curriculum combined with the opportunity of developing in-depth study and research skills.

We provide five hours per week of tuition for each A level subject in the first year and six hours per subject per week in the second year. All Year 12 students will have one hour per week of PSHE too.

An increasing number of students also join MPW at the end of Year 12 either to complete the studies that they have started at their previous schools or to change direction with a new approach or a new set of subjects.

One-Year A level Courses

These self-contained courses cover the complete syllabus in one year and are run entirely separately from the second year of our two-year programme. One-year courses are designed for students with previous

experience of A level work and include the option of taking up a new subject that may not have been available to them at school. This often allows them to rethink their UCAS options in a fresh and constructive manner. For one-year courses we provide seven hours of tuition per subject per week.

Retake A level Courses

At MPW there are two main course duration and start date options for retake students at A level. The choice between these options often depends on previous grades, university aspirations and gap year plans.

Our September to June course suits those students who require thorough revision of all papers, often over more than one subject. Under the current curriculum it is no longer possible merely to retake a subset of the papers that contribute to the overall grade and the full-year course is usually the safest and most effective means of securing a significant improvement.

The other main option is the January to June short retake course which may suit those who have narrowly missed their target grade, who perhaps have gap-year activities such as work experience or travel plans during the Autumn term and whose new UCAS application does not need to reference the academic progress made during a retake course. It is essential to discuss the various short retake options carefully at interview.

GCSE at MPW

Our one-year GCSE courses allow those who wish to transfer to MPW at the end of Years 9 or 10 to do so with the minimum of disruption. Our small group sizes ensure that we are able to monitor each student's progress very carefully and provide individual help and attention where required.

Two-Year and One-Year Courses

Our GCSE core curriculum programme allows those who wish to transfer to MPW at the beginning of Year 10 or Year 11 to do so with the minimum of disruption to their studies. The two-year course is a fully integrated programme covering the requirements of the National Curriculum. These include English, Mathematics, Humanities, Modern Languages and Science. Students may take up to eight subjects. Students taking one-year GCSE courses are taught in self-contained groups that cover all aspects of subject specifications over the course of the academic year. One-year courses are intensive and this is an important consideration when deciding on the number of subjects that should be taken.

Students who are under 16 at the beginning of the school year are expected to be full-time. Students in this age group are required to participate in a wider range of activities than their older counterparts. In addition to the academic timetable, all students are supported by a PSHE programme that encourages them to understand their role in society and uphold the values of freedom, tolerance and respecting the rule of law. The PSHE programme also covers personal well-being, healthy relationships, personal finance, careers education, current affairs and general studies.

GCSE students register at 8.45 am each morning and again at 1.45 pm in the afternoons. Wherever possible, GCSE lessons are timetabled between the hours of 9.00 am and 4.00 pm. When not in timetabled lessons, students work under supervision in the Andrew Lewin Study centre.



PSHE and Sport

All students attend classes in PSHE and Sport. Our PSHE programme covers the curricula for PSHE, RSE and citizenship. It also teaches students study skills, prepares them for sixth-form study or the world of work and emphasises the importance of maintaining a safe and healthy lifestyle. Our Sports programme has been substantially enriched in recent years and now includes football, badminton, basketball, yoga and tennis.

MPW Prize Winners



Support Tuition and Easter Revision

MPW runs a number of courses for students from other schools and colleges. These usually take place after school, on Saturday mornings or during school holidays.

Support Tuition

We run a busy individual tuition programme for students already studying GCSE or A level courses at other schools. Easter Revision

During the Easter holiday we offer GCSE and A level revision courses for students in Years 11, 12 and 13 studying at schools throughout the UK. These courses build understanding and confidence by providing intensive revision of core topics, daily examination practice and help with study and revision skills.

Our tutors are highly qualified graduates whose experience at MPW has trained them to be particularly adept at building students' confidence quickly and efficiently. Many are GCSE and A level examiners and are therefore attuned to the requirements and approaches of the various examination boards.

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
