

Personal Statement

Your Personal Statement will determine whether admission tutors decide to invite you for your medical interview.

What should you include in your Personal Satatement in order to demonstrate your motivation, suitability, insight and exploration?

Your tutors, including experts in the field, will support and guide you with your Personal Statement.

Aptitude tests (UCAT/BMAT)

Aptitude tests are part of the application process. Most universities require applicants to take UCAT (the University Clinical Aptitude Test) or BMAT (Biomedical Admissions Test).

How do universities use your UCAT/BMAT results?

You will not only learn more about the UCAT/BMAT aptitude test structure, but will also get a chance to practise these tests in your lessons. You will be given advice on how best to prepare for UCAT/ BMAT and will learn more about how universities use UCAT/BMAT to determine the success of your application. In addition, you will attend special lessons aimed at developing your critical thinking skills. All this preparation will help you to perform well on your big day.

Medical interview

You only get one chance at this. Moreover, your interview may be the crucial factor in distinguishing between you and other candidates with similar results.

What else can you do to prepare for your big day?


Going the extra mile - expanding your knowledge


